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


Cerritos Garment Manufacturing makes

ots of people have dreams, but few people have the energy it takes to make their dreams come true," says John D. Clark,

Chairman Emeritus of Prudential and founder of the Cerritos Garment Manufacturing plant. "Garment Manufacturing started out as just an idea. Now, it is one of the Company's most promising assets."

With Mr. Clark at the helm, Cerritos Garment Manufacturing was launched in May of 1985. A 42,000 square foot building on Manning Way was leased, and the process of hiring employees and locating the proper equipment began. By late Fall of the same year, the plant was fully staffed and running. Now, Cerritos Garment Manufacturing produces over 10,000 shirts, pants, and uniforms each week.

"We really started from scratch," says President Dan Clark. "None of us had any experience on the manu-

facturing side of the uniform rental business." John D. Clark agreed. "It was a real learning experience," says the elder Clark. "We must have changed pant patterns two or three times before we got it right. When one of our pieces of equipment broke down, no one knew how to fix it," he explained. "Luckily, we found a man from Georgia who had the


technical knowledge we needed. In fact, he's still working for us." That man is Mike Bullard, Head Mechanic at the Cerritos plant.

Working as a team, Mike and John D. Clark put together one of the most

modern, state-of-the-art garment manufacturing plants west of the Mississippi. "The equipment cost us a lot of money, but it has proven to be worthwhile in the long run," says Mr. John. Cerritos Garment Manufacturing now boasts 115 employees, including new General Manager Sunny Mukherjee. The plant also has its own in-house Lettering and Embroidery operation, which lets the rental plants personalize uniforms as requested by each customer.

Part of the move towards efficiency was the placement of facsimile (FAX) machines in each of Prudential's 20 plants. Orders can

Cerritos Garment Manufacturing currently only produces uniforms for the other Prudential plants, new markets are being explored, and outside customers may eventually be pursued.

For now, though, John D. Clark believes the operation is moving along well. "They've done a good job as far as helping our customers and meeting their needs," he says. "We've been fortunate to have such a good staff at the plant. They are all very good at what they do, and very loyal to the Company," he



New employee transfer policy implemented



ith the steady growth Prudential has experienced over the years came a need for more Company policies. The

newest written instruction is the Employee Transfer Policy.

The Policy lists the steps to be taken when an employee wants to be considered for a transfer to another job or location. This form is <u>different</u> from the Career Planning Form mentioned on page 11. Some of the information included in the Policy includes:

 A transfer is moving to an equal level job, on a lateral basis, with no significant increase or decrease in job responsibilities and/or pay oppor-



tunities.

 Employees must be in their present job for at least six months before a Transfer Application can be filled out.

- An employee should not discuss a transfer with another supervisor or manager without first getting approval from his or her own immediate supervisor.
- Employees interested in applying for a transfer should request a Transfer Application Form from their immediate supervisor.

Total Service Concept - Section 5:

Eye-opener tag system

You probably know it well by now. In the last four issues of *Off-the-Cuff*, we have featured a section of Prudential's Total Service Concept. Total Service Concept is a system of insuring total commitment by every Prudential employee to quality products and excellent service. This is the fifth section of the system: eye-opener tags.

What do the tags look like?

The tags are rectangular in size, and are bright yellow in color. Text on the tags is in both english and spanish. A poster, with instructions on how and when to use the tags, is mounted on the walls above the supply of tags at each plant.

How does it work?

A supply of tags is provided at each delivery location. Customer employees fill out a tag when they have a service request for a particular garment. The tag is attached to a button on that garment, so that the tag stays with the garment throughout processing. It is then routed to the Mending Department, where the service request is accomplished.

What are the advantages?

The tags help alert Prudential employees to hard-to-find repairs, such as holes in pockets. This means garments can be delivered in good condition.

The Prudential Job Preference and Career Planning Form is here to help.

According to the Human Resources Department, the form is to be filled out by most employees once a year. The form allows employees a chance to inform Prudential Management of their job preferences, career goals, and training needs. They can also use the form to nominate themselves for other positions in the Company.

After being completed by employees, the Form is reviewed by the immediate supervisor, and then by each level of management above the supervisor. After being reviewed by Management, up to and including the President, the form is kept in the personnel file of the employee.

Comments and job preferences listed on these forms are very carefully reviewed by Management. Prudential firmly believes in promoting from within when possible, so this is a great chance for employees to make their supervisors aware of their goals. If you have not received a Career Planning Form, you can request one from your immediate supervisor.

Before joining Prudential, Lee was employed by the County Orange Sanitation District. "I am looking forward to getting an overall view of how environmental issues and haz-




small change you can make to get closer to your goal. Change habits slowly, and they'll last a lifetime!
